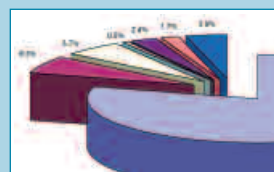

UNITED CEREBRAL PALSY EXPANDS CHILDREN'S SERVICES

UCP hosted an Open House announcing the Save Mart CARES/UCP Sensory Integration Clinic, the only one of its kind in San Joaquin County. The event was attended by many UCP partners, UCP Board and community members. The Greater Stockton Chamber of Commerce was on hand for the ribbon-cutting ceremony along with Chamber Ambassadors. ribbon cutters were Rev. Dwight Williams, UCP Board President, and Julie Schumacher, Executive Director. Alicia Rockwell with Save Mart CARES Foundation was presented with an honorary plaque, and the Foundation was recognized as a

major partner, giving \$56,169 in helping establish the Clinic. The Clinic is designed to serve children 0-12 years of age and provides therapeutic vestibular and proprioceptive activities such as swinging and jumping into foam to help children organize and channel sensory stimulations/input so they can perform tasks necessary for

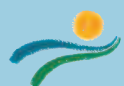

From the Director

Dear Friends,



At the time of this writing I am just a few weeks away from retiring as Executive Director of United Cerebral Palsy.

I began at UCP in September of 1980. At the time we were providing one adult day program with an enrollment of 26. The budget was about \$100,000 annually. Hard work, perseverance and a desire to see more opportunities available for persons with disabilities combined with a bit of naiveté, good timing, talented staff members and committed board members brought the organization to where it is today. This past year the organization provided services to 2,037 children and adults, including a total of 281,000 hours of critical services. This year the budget exceeds 5.3 million dollars. It is astounding to me to realize how far we have come and the difference we have made in the lives of so many.

Even today, after 26 years, I am deeply touched by the generosity and spirit of giving that continues to flourish in this community. Many thanks to all of you, the generous individuals, community leaders and business organizations that support the UCP mission and, like us, believe that when children and adults with disabilities are included in the community all of our lives are greatly enriched.

I want to thank the UCP staff for their hard work, dedication, commitment and professionalism even when faced with the most difficult of circumstances. To each very special UCP board member who has served the organization so selflessly over these past years, I will forever be indebted to you for your wisdom, foresight and support. I feel truly privileged to have been associated with such exceptional individuals.

I know that there are many exciting opportunities ahead for UCP. I will miss being a part of it. Wishing you all the very best for the future.

Our son's UCP respite buddies work to fill this need in Dimitri's life at a time when typical friends are often hard to find. Like many teens in his age group, Dimitri enjoys "hanging out" on Fridays, computers, comics, drums, hip music, dance moves, and active outdoor sports. We have found Dimitri's UCP respite helpers to be the best in providing these vital typical opportunities for him.

Each weekend, Dimitri looks forward to his Friday night with his cool "respite pal" Adam.

They often begin in the early evening with a comic book art project and make an easy fix dinner. Then they do some exercise and eat. The two Friday buddies often conclude the evening by watching extreme wrestling on TV, a drum session or listening to a new rhythmic CD. On Saturdays and Sundays they are usually outdoors for long walks, a run or a bike ride around the neighborhood. This is often followed by a picnic and ball park session. He always returns home smiling and refreshed from all the great exercise and fresh air!

The UCP Respite program has really made a difference in our son's life. Every day, people with disabilities in San Joaquin County are fortunate to have the support of hard working respite and support staff at the local United Cerebral Palsy Association. 

From the Board President



As the new year begins I am half way through my first term as President of the United Cerebral Palsy Board of Directors. I am proud and excited to have the opportunity to work with the fantastic board members and staff of the organization to benefit the children, adults and their families who are living with a disability and who reside in our greater San Joaquin County area.

UCP is providing over 12 programs. This past year, 281,000 hours of direct services designed to serve a specific age group and need or interest area were provided. The impact this makes in the community is dramatic, and for each person receiving services it is a life enhancing experience. Recently, the UCP national organization listed our affiliate as the eighth most effective affiliate in the country in making a significant contribution to its service area.

As we move forward I plan to lead the organization to continued accomplishments by developing plans for a greater organizational influence in the area of legislative advocacy and community awareness on behalf of persons with cerebral palsy and similar disabilities. Although our community has made positive changes in providing an inclusive environment for those with disabilities, there is more to be done. It is important for UCP to continue to educate the public and our legislature about the issues that can negatively impact so many lives. One of the methods we will use to communicate these issues is through a grass roots effort using the internet in a program exclusively for UCP affiliates in California called GetActive. This is an email site for the purpose of engaging more individuals in advocating for the needs of persons with disabilities and those who provide services to them. It is also with great sadness that we will be saying goodbye to Julie Schumacher, who is retiring after 26 years of dedicated service as Executive Director of United Cerebral Palsy. Julie's accomplishments are enormous; taking the agency from a \$100,000 annual operating budget to over a \$5 million annual budget. She has enhanced programs and services throughout the tri-county and has established satellite offices in Manteca and Stockton to meet the growing need of this special and courageous population of children and adults with disabilities. Most recently, UCP children's services were expanded with the opening of a Sensory Integration Clinic. As we say goodbye, we also celebrate and give tribute to Julie for her dedication, passion and the legacy she leaves with us. She will not be forgotten.

In closing I want to thank you all for your support of United Cerebral Palsy and wish you a happy and prosperous year.

2005-2006 Programs & Services

It is through United Cerebral Palsy's programs and services that children and adults with cerebral palsy and other disabilities are empowered and acquire skills to live life to their fullest every day.

It takes continued dedication to our work to make a difference for this growing population of **courageous** people, and to transform the lives of the

many infants, toddlers, adolescents and adults in our community who need our help. An estimated 10,000 new cases are now occurring at birth or infancy each year – that's double the number of new cases from just a decade ago.

In fiscal year 2005-2006, 2,037 adults and children with cerebral palsy and other disabilities and their families benefited from our programs and services.

ACCOMPLISHMENTS

Clinical and Family Services Department

- **Creative Intervention** – served 350 children and provided 6,192 in-home service hours.
- **Great Beginnings** – served 689 children and provided 1,556 service hours.

Our Early Intervention programs serve children 0-5 years of age. Intervention activities are provided by physical and speech therapists and developmental specialists. Programs provide case management, hearing and developmental screenings in addition to "play therapies" in the child's home and/or natural environment or at UCP's Sensory Integration Clinic. Parents receive the tools, training and support to meet their child's cognitive, physical, communication, social and adaptive or emotional needs. In addition, sixteen training workshops were offered and attended by 207 adults this past fiscal year.



- **Assistive Technology Assessment/Support (TRACS)** – served 340 individuals and provided 1,166 service hours.

Services include seating and positioning assessments, environmental assessments, school based assessments and therapy, monthly assessments at gait clinic, and loans from our assistive technology lending library (174 items were checked out).



Adult Programs & Services

- **Stockton Adult Activity Center** - served 70 individuals and provided 14,750 service hours
- **Stockton Adult Development Center** – served 46 individuals and provided 9,263 service hours.
- **Manteca Adult Development Center** – served 39 individuals and provided 8,403 service hours.
- **Program Without Walls** – served 28 individuals and provided 5,273 service hours.

The above Adult Day programs are designed to assist individuals with severe physical and cognitive disabilities in reaching their highest level of independence and in gaining basic skills. Services are provided in the day program facility and in the community which is an integral component of the day program. Participants include those that reside in Lodi and Tracy as well as Stockton and Manteca.

- **Supports to Achieve Independent Living (SAIL)** – served 71 individuals and provided 27,175 service hours.

SAIL is designed to establish adults with severe disabilities in their own home or apartment and provides ongoing support for the individual to continue an independent lifestyle. Support services include personal care needs, shopping, banking, money management, transportation and many other services depending on the needs of the individual.



- **Respite** – served 55 children and adults and provided 5,353 service hours.

Respite is designed to provide the child's or dependent adult's parents with a temporary break as the primary care provider from the strenuous daily challenges of caring for an individual with a disability. The program also provides social and recreational opportunities for the child or adult. This is accomplished



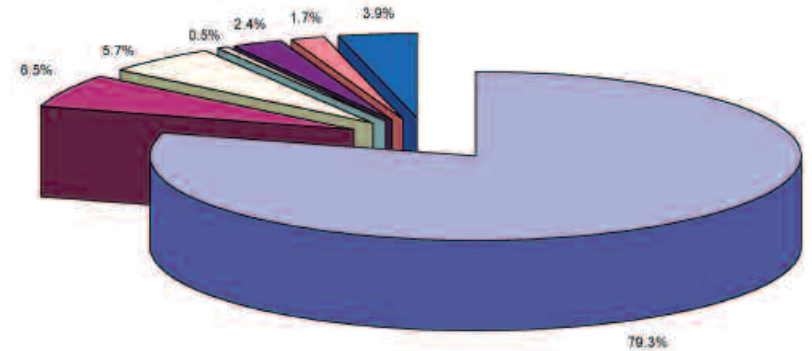

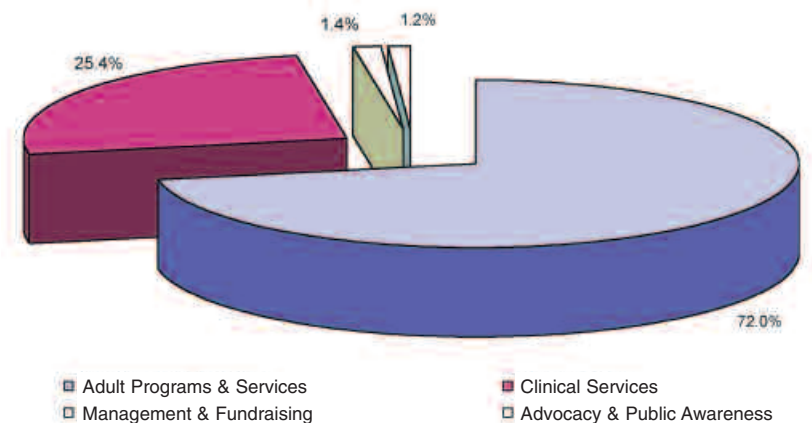

- **Supported Employment** – served 142 persons with disabilities and provided 15,488 service hours.

This program provides job placements, training and continued support for adults with physical disabilities and those who have not previously been considered employable. Individuals are placed in jobs specific to his/her interests and abilities within the business community. The program enables the disabled employee to achieve his/her maximum potential and gain the highest level of independence and self-esteem.

The kitchen at the Hammer Ranch based site is now sparkling with brand new custom made cabinets and countertops from the generosity of Bob Leons, who supplied the countertops, and Chris Ellsworth, Owner of Commercial Design in Lodi, who supplied all the materials and installation of this project.

The Hammer Ranch-based site is a 4,000 square foot facility that has been in operation since 2000. The program continues to successfully provide daily services to up to 40 adults with severe disabilities and is designed to provide the highest level of quality programming and personal care services to ensure the health, safety and dignity of all consumers. Last fiscal year, the program provided over 12,800 hours of service.

"The kitchen was in desperate need of a new face lift, and we just didn't have the means to update it," states Mike Moser, Program Manger of the Hammer Ranch Adult Development Center. The kitchen is used daily to help with cooking projects, preparing meals and holiday functions, and is a big part of the program.
